#### **PARISH NOTES**

**THIS WEEKEND** we celebrate the nineteenth Sunday in ordinary time. The gospel continues from St John ch.6 - tells of the Bread of Heaven.

In other years we would celebrate St Dominic, the founder of the community of Dominican priests, sisters and brothers. St Dominic is pictured in one of St Charles' windows receiving a rosary from Our Blessed Lady: he is credited with being the first promoter of the rosary. Members of the parish rosary group are urged to the Luminous mysteries on Monday.

PATRON SAINTS OF EUROPE feature in the church's calendar with great frequency. There are five of them, and they each merit a Feast Day. St Teresa Benedicta is honoured on Monday. Born Edith Stein, a Jewess, she was for many years an atheist before discovering the works of St Teresa of Avila & St John of the Cross. She became a Carmelite nun, but was deported to Auschwitz and martyred on 9th August 1942. May she intercede for us.

ST LAWRENCE was one of the first deacons. On his feastday on Tuesday we may pray for our own deacon, Owen, and his fellow deacons in our diocese.

**NEXT SUNDAY** is 15th August, and we celebrate he Solemnity of the Assumption. Readers beware!

MARY'S FUNERAL took place from St Charles during the week. It was distinctive and memorable in curious ways. Mary had no relatives at all. She was helped during her later years by a kindly friend, Jim; he and his wife were the 'chief mourners'. Mary died after years in Regency Hall care home on the Carriage Drive; four members of staff came to the church for her leave-taking. One further friend was there, as well as small group of parishioners representing her only 'family', the church. A tiny congregation for a tiny lady. Mary was distinctive in her attitudes! She had stipulated minimum fuss, and certainly no wastage of money on flowers. And no eulogy or speeches. And no singing. We listened to a little decorous 'piped-music', including Ave Maria in her honour.

The cortege to the cemetery was just one vehicle apart from the undertaker's hearse and me. On the journey up Station Rd, shoppers emerging from various enterprises paused and bowed—and even made the sign of the Cross. I rarely see that these days, but was delighted

that Mary was so respected. A quiet and dignified taking-off. I hope Mary was pleased! "MEETING POINT" is a new parish enterprise to begin to bring people socially together again after so much lockdown. Last Saturday the oratory was busy for 90 minutes with good folk assisting, visiting, chatting - end enjoying lavish refreshments. It was a good start, and those who came along were delighted. The planning team will soon meet to evaluate the startup and plan some more. If you have a wish to assist, let me know and I'll put you in touch before the next get-together.

A PILGRIM BAND made their way to St Charles late in the week. A quartet of delightful and rainsoaked folk came from the Horwich/Bolton area in search of the resting place of Mona Baroness Beaumont, the wife of the last Baron Howard of Glossop. This eager group journeyed on innumerable buses and trains, survived cloudbursts and violent winds to get to St Charles. They were soaked, and their umbrellas looked pitifully inadequate against the tempest as they trailed from Hadfield station down to St Charles, and stand above the crypt where the baroness is laid to rest, and to marvel at the decorations festooning the walls nearby. They had known the Baroness and spoke very fondly of her many acts of kindness. I was pleased to make them welcome, and was very touched by their enthusiasm to seek and find their friend, and honour her. I noted to them that the Baroness had become Baroness of Glossop in the year of my birth, and that she died a few weeks after my ordination. I admire people with such indefatigable enthusiasms!
