

PARISH NOTES

THIS SUNDAY we celebrate the 33rd Sunday in ordinary time. It is the last of the 'numbered' Sundays. Next weekend we will celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, the final Sunday of the liturgical year, before we begin all over again with the first season of the year of the church—Advent. Today's Gospel invites us all to do a bit of spiritual stock-taking. To help us to be honest with ourselves in our stock-taking we are reminded today that this world will come to an end one day. We do not know when or how, but that end will come. It will be followed immediately by the general judgment. Christ will come in power and glory to judge the whole human race. Each one will be designated that future, that eternity merited while on earth. The just will enter with Him into eternal glory. The wicked will go to their place of suffering, sorrow, and remorse. Each one of us can put the following simple question to ourselves this very moment. How would I fare if I were called before the judgment seat of God today? The best of us would certainly prefer to be better prepared. There is so much good I have left undone, so many faults for which I have not atoned properly, so many uncharitable thoughts about my friends and neighbours in my mind, so many acts of charity I kept postponing, so many acts of thanksgiving and praise I have not made to my loving God. The Christian who wants to die in the state of grace, that is, in the friendship of God (and can there be any real Christian who would not want to?) has but one way of making sure of this. He is to try to live always in God's friendship. The man who does this by living his Christian life daily need not fear death. It may be a sudden death, but it will never be an unprovided-for death.

'DAY FOR THE POOR' This Sunday our Holy Father asks us to pray for the poor throughout the world. His message can easily be found on the Vatican website. His message begins: "Jesus Christ… for your sakes became poor" (cf. 2 Cor 8:9). With these words, the Apostle Paul addresses the first Christians of Corinth in order to encourage their efforts to show solidarity with their brothers and sisters in need. The World Day of the Poor comes this year as a healthy challenge, helping us to reflect on our style of life and

on the many forms of poverty all around us".

AMONG THE SAINTS who are honoured this week: on Wednesday St Margaret of Scotland (1046 - 1093) was born in Hungary of Anglo-Saxon and Hungarian parents. When William of Normandy conquered England she found refuge with King Malcolm III of Scotland, and they were married in 1070 and had eight children. She reformed the royal court, founded monasteries, and supported major reforms of Church life. She died in Edinburgh on 16 November 1093. She is remembered for the happiness of her marriage, for her devotion to prayer and learning, and especially for her generosity to the poor. On Thursday: St Hugh of Lincoln (1140 - 1200) was born near Grenoble in France and entered the Carthusian monastery of La Grande Chartreuse at the age of 25. In 1175 he was asked by King Henry II of England to become prior of a Carthusian house in England, and a decade later he was appointed bishop of Lincoln, a post which he accepted only when directly commanded to do so by the prior of La Grande Chartreuse. His diocese was the largest in England, and he spent the rest of his life in ceaseless work there. He delegated much authority. He was a friend (and critic) of successive kings, but also

worked with his own hands on the extension of his cathedral. He gained a great reputation for justice, the care of the sick, and the support of the oppressed: he risked his life to help the Jewish community. He died in London on 16 November 1200 and was declared a saint in 1220, the first Carthusian to be canonized. Lincoln is of course a major city in our diocese. St Hugh is secondary patron of the diocese. **THE REQUIEM MASS** for the late Sheila Gerrard is indicated for Immaculate Conception church this Thursday 17th November at 12.30. May she rest in peace.

A number of our parishioners are representing our community at various cenotaphs, placing wreaths on our behalf. Our thanks to you for that dedication.
- * Cemetery Visit: This Sunday afternoon I hope to visit Glossop cemetery and bless the graves of those family, friends and parishioners whom you indicate to me.
- * **Public Prayers** are offered for the parish dead at every Mass celebrated during this month. "It is a holy and a wholesome thing to pray for the dead".

ST MARGARET'S FEASTDAY is celebrated next Wednesday. Several staff and pupils plan to join us for morning Mass at St Charles to honour their patroness.

Please take bring counterfoils back soon. FIRST HOLY COMMUNION is a great annual parish celebration. It is dated for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, June 11th 2023 at St Charles. Our dedicated catechist have arranged for this tuition to take place before Sunday Masses in the oratory. Want to help? Let me know!
