

PARISH NOTES

THIS SUNDAY introduces us to St John the Baptist, the great forerunner of Christ, the last of the great prophets 'preparing the way of the Lord'.

"As the journey of Advent continues, as we prepare to celebrate the nativity of Christ, John the Baptist's call to conversion sounds out in our communities. It is a pressing invitation to open our hearts and to welcome the Son of God Who comes among us to make divine judgement manifest. The Father, writes St. John the Evangelist, does not judge anyone, but has entrusted the power of judgement to the Son, because He is the Son of man. "And it is today, in the present, that we decide our future destiny. It is with our concrete everyday behaviour in this life that we determine our eternal fate. At the end of our days on earth, at the moment of death, we will be evaluated on the basis of our likeness or otherwise to the Baby Who is about to be born in the poor grotto of Bethlehem, because He is the measure God has given humanity. Through the Gospel John the Baptist continues to speak down the centuries to each generation. His hard clear words bring health to us, the men and women of this day in which even the experience and perception of Christmas often, unfortunately, reflects materialist attitudes. The 'voice' of the great prophet asks us to prepare the way for the coming Lord in the deserts of today, internal and external deserts, thirsting for the water of life which is Christ." — Benedict XVI

LECTIONARY READINGS for this liturgical year: Sundays: Year A (St Matthew); weekdays: Year II. **SAINTS ALIVE** Among the saints we honour this week: **St Nicholas** was bishop of Myra, in Lycia (now part of Turkey) and died about the middle of the fourth century. He has been venerated throughout the Church, especially since the 10th century. Because of his help to the poor he is the patron saint of pawnbrokers, whose insignia of three golden balls represent the three purses of gold he is said to have given secretly to a poor man who could not afford dowries for his three daughters. And of course St Nicholas is 'Santa Claus'. Quite how he got confused with the ruddy-cheeked, white-bearded, reindeer-driven, sleigh-mounted, North-Pole domiciled chimney-down-climbing jolly gent is another mystery...

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception: The doctrine of the Immaculate Conception is the doctrine that the Virgin Mary was conceived without original sin, that twist in our nature that makes our will tend not to follow what it knows to be right. It was this grace that enabled Mary to give a true and considered "Yes" to the request, conveyed by the Angel Gabriel, that she should consent to be the mother of the incarnate God.

The doctrine was almost universally believed over the centuries but was only formally defined as a doctrine of the Church by Pope Pius IX in 1854. Because it is so old, it is one of the Marian doctrines that Islam shares with the Catholic Church, though of course the theological details are very different.

Additionally, on Sunday afternoon the 11th Dec, at St Mary's church in Glossop, there will be a short penitential service, and chance to go to Confession to one of a number of priests.

By slow degrees more flickers of liveliness began to appear erratically. On Friday I was making my usual first Friday visits and responded to a call to keep company in the local care home. I journeyed on to my next port of call. And out of the blue the whole system revived. The Lord had listened, but said Wait! Be patient! So, from then on in my house-to-housing the Pope's rosary echoed through the car and I was able to give thanks for a small Advent miracle.
